April (5th Monday) 29th Fentimans By John Carslake

When iron puddler Thomas Fentiman was given a recipe for ginger beer in return for an unpaid debt in 1905, little did he know that it marked the start of a business which would one day compete on an international stage. The unassuming business man began using the recipe and producing botanically brewed ginger beer, which he delivered door-to-door using a horse and cart for transport.

His ginger beer was stored in handmade stone jars known as grey hens, which were stamped with an image of his pet dog, Fearless, who had won awards for obedience at Crufts.



According to the internet an iron puddler was an occupation in iron manufacturing – a process to convert pig-iron into wrought iron with the use of a reverberatory furnace. The strenuous labour, heat and fumes caused puddlers to have a short life expectancy with most dying in their 30s. Hardly surprising that Thomas Fentiman gave it all up to produce and sell ginger beer.

Fish and chips at Beamish Open-Air-Museum are

always washed down with a Fentimans Ginger Beer, likewise on the ferry across to the Isle of Mull in 2018 a Fentimans Ginger Beer was enjoyed.

Notes from the Vicarage

Medieval map-makers drew Jerusalem at the centre of their world. They saw it as the meeting point between the three continents they knew: Europe, Asia and Africa. Its symbolic significance is immense for many people, Jews, Muslims and Christians, but its fame has always been hard to relate to its physical reality, which is rather small and crowded. It has nothing of the grandeur of Rome or Athens. It has little vegetation and water. And it has seldom enjoyed peace.

The Biblical image of Jerusalem as a haven of peace, a holy city, a place of pilgrimage sits uneasily with its reality as a locus of war and division – a contested city.

Jerusalem stands for all that is complex, contradictory and confused. It is the holy city stalked by evil; a place where the absent God is most likely to be encountered, and where God's will is both thwarted and fulfilled. Jesus embraces Jerusalem.

Jerusalem is our city too, in our world. It's the kind of place in which a government minister can propose a bill and then immediately go into the lobby to vote it down. It's the safe, sleepy city rocked by earthquakes and, where just a few short years later, scores of innocent people seeking only a peaceful future are gunned down by a deranged madman who thinks they are invaders.

Jesus embraces this, our real world in all its complexity, its confusion and contradictions. He reveals that it is in the heart of *this* real, messy world that love will be most fully revealed and that God's true purposes will be laid bare. This is the place where, against all the odds and, contrary to any kind of common sense, peace will be made possible.

It was in the very midst of the hurt and the confusion seen in Jerusalem that life-giving love was poured out by Jesus and shown to be stronger than all that destroys. I dare to believe that the same love can still heal and transform our contradictions, hurts and frustrations wherever they may occur.

In Christ, God's new world order has already come close. We have good reason to cling onto hope. And this is why we shall celebrate Easter.
