Notes from the Vicarage

The church is about people, not buildings – or so we're told. But I don't swallow this entirely. Buildings matter too for all sorts of reasons. I was sad to see the Chapel close because of all that it has represented: a focus of faith, a place to mark, celebrate and mourn the key moments of human life, a place too that helped us see our true place in the world. It must be hard for those who loved it so much to see its transformation into something different, though mitigated, I hope, by the realisation that it will still be used and enjoyed in a new way.

We are about to start a new project that will help us see our village churches in a new light and to use them in the best possible way for the benefit of as many in the community who wish to use them. 'Rural Churches for Everyone' begins next month. It is supported by a generous grant from the Lottery Fund and is a two-year project. The Moorland Group of Parishes of which we're part will be one of the four key areas in which the work will be focused. We'll be working to draw up a realistic and achievable plan for the care and development of every church in the group – including, of course, St Mary's and St. John's.

In the case of our two churches here, it's important that we not only think imaginatively about how they may be used, but we must also ensure that we complement other initiatives in the village. There's no way, for example, that we wish to appear in competition with the Commemoration Hall as a venue; but we could develop some things that might work better in the churches, such as a space for concerts or exhibitions, as indeed we're already doing on an occasional basis (see, for example, the notice of an exciting exhibition in St John's this month of works by Paul Kenny). St John's in particular also has a wonderful acoustic for a church so intimate.

I'm convinced that the heritage of buildings we've been given is one that can't just be dismissed. The big challenge is to explore how best we can ensure their future in a sustainable way.
