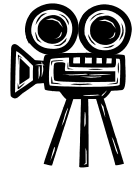

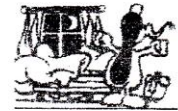

**Notes from the Vicarage**

It's Lent, one of two the times of the year (Advent is the other) which the church sets aside as a time of reflection and traditionally, of penitence.

Penitence - calling to mind our shortcoming and wrongdoings and saying sorry for them does not seem like much fun. There is also a real danger in self-indulgent wallowing in the remembrance our sins if that saps our energy to get up, dust ourselves down and move on and do something worthwhile; but I am concerned that we have built a society in which we don't take enough responsibility for our failures and are too hasty to find others to blame.

Take, for example, the immediate reaction to the terrible murder of students in Parkland Florida last month. Florida's Governor Rick Scott's reaction was quick to say that "you come to the conclusion that this is absolutely pure evil."

Yes, it is evil, but it's more complicated than that, as is the rush, especially by those who have no wish to change gun laws in the USA, to declare that the killer was mentally ill. Such a claim, however well-founded it might be, doesn't get us off the hook. The bottom line is that we must be careful that we don't try to distance ourselves from taking our responsibility for a society in which such a horror is possible. Mindless scapegoating is wrong.

Sorrow for our part in the mess we sometimes make in the world is so important. For unless we admit that we too must be sorry, we will continue to thrash around for someone else to blame and we won't see that a better way forward may start with each and every one of us.

The good news is that if we are sorry, we may dare to believe that God will forgive us and give us a fresh start. That's heart the message of Lent - and of Easter. And if you think such a hope is a cop out and has no substance, all I can suggest is that you try believing it and see what difference it can make.

## A Wine Holiday in Alsace

Monday 25 June to Tuesday 3 July (8 nights in France).

For many years Helen and Olwen have led an annual wine holiday to France in late spring. So many Slaley folk have asked about it that we thought you should know about it here. New faces are very welcome.

Our group isn't large, not more than 18 people, and the cost of the holiday includes transport to and from the North East, all meals and wine with dinner. It's also possible to buy wine from the growers we'll meet and bring it home in the coach – all the way to Slaley. We will be staying for our first and last nights in Abbeville, and in Alsace itself we will be at the lovely Auberge Ramstein in the lovely village of Scherwiller, right in the heart of the classic vineyard area.

The cost (in a shared room) is £1499. There is a modest single supplement. Our intention is not to look for a commercial margin on this trip, we're simply attempting to cover our costs. We'll travel to and from the North East in a 29 seater coach from Weardale Motors.

**Slaley Forest Police Presence:** Email reply from PC L .Davison it is the intention to work with the FC to provide a presence regarding education and enforcement in the area .Two motor bikers have been issued with car seizure warning notices for driving "off piste" in the area. PC Davison asked that the public be encouraged to report illegal vehicle activity via 101.

**Discussion with County Councillor:** Tree pruning on Wooley road – no update.

Bird nesting regulations come into force at the end of February. Highways to be contacted re: branches on the lines to ask for pruning work to be done as a matter of urgency.

Broadband- Wooley road new boxes on telegraph poles. Todburn to receive a voucher.

New problems include the drain at Shield Hall corner which has experienced flooding across all the south bound carriageway. The roadside drain outside Slaley School is again blocked.

Next Meeting: March 12th

The Community Agreement on using the School grounds was revised - the main change is the following statement on page 3: **The facilities are closed from 7.30 a.m. – 6 p.m. Monday to Thursday and from 7.30 a.m. – 3.15 p.m. on Fridays during school time. The facilities will be open at all times during weekends and school holidays, until dusk (when the village street lights come on).**

**Only the school field to be used for ball games** – there is restricted entry for very young children to the enclosed nursery play area and the school and the walls of these buildings must not be used for ball games.

**Responsibility of children lies solely with parents and carers.**

It is their responsibility to ensure that children arrive at and leave the field safely. Slaley First School can take no responsibility for any child using the field.

**Please respect other residents' right to peace and a safe environment.**

The school playing field is surrounded by private houses. Owners expect you to have fun and cause some noise, but bad language is not acceptable and its continued use will involve loss of privileges

**Cycles must be used only on the footpath which will replace the BMX track.** Cycling on the school field will result in loss of privileges.

**Tennis Posts and net.** The posts and net will be stored in the wooden storage unit next to the wooden sheds. Please return them to the storage unit when not in use.

**Outdoor Table Tennis.** The net and bats are stored in the wooden storage unit next to the wooden sheds. Please return them to the storage unit when not in use.

**Storage Box.** The storage unit will not be locked and we hope that the community will appreciate this facility and not abuse its use.
