Gardening Column- March

Karen Melvin

This is the start of the gardening year in the vegetable garden. I sow seeds of tomatoes, peppers, cape gooseberries and early salads in the greenhouse in Feb. I use a method from a book "Know and Grow Vegetables" from the Garden Research Centre, that I read many years ago. I can sow the whole veggie plot in a stack of margarine/ cream cheese tubs on a warm kitchen shelf. And I can save my seed for years because it is easy to monitor germination. Put in some paper towel, moisten and sew small batches on the paper and put on the lid. I mix non-similar types of seed to save space. Make sure you label them. When they germinate, prick out with tweezers into little individual pots or seeds trays. Because we are so high up and cold I like to get this early start in the greenhouse, using small individual pots and planting out when it is warmer.


Seed sowing list for garden 700' altitude near Slaley

Tomatoes, peppers, cape gooseberry are all grown in the greenhouse. Other seedlings are in trays or pots in the greenhouse, cloche or sheltered space and planted out when ready, after hardening off. If still cold, I cover courgettes, french beans and sweet corn with plastic over hoops of 1" plastic plumber's piping. Spinach likes to be covered with perforated plastic touching the leaves in my garden; it doesn't then dry out or go to seed.

Feb 4- 20 Mar

Tomatoes, and Leeks for pots in greenhouse or cloche. Spinach, Lettuce and Greens for trays or pots in greenhouse. Summer Cauliflower for trays in greenhouse.

Mar 1- 12 Seakale, spinach, beet, for trays in greenhouse Broad Beans, Beetroot, Onion sets, spring onion

Notes from the Vicarage

I guess it was only to be expected that the Corona Virus outbreak would stir the tabloid press into an orgy of dystopian hyperbole: 'Killer Virus Crisis – Britons trapped in Hotel Hell' and so on. I suspect that it will get much worse as the virus claims ever more cases - as seems highly probable.

We need to gain a sense of proportion. One the one hand, I've seldom known medical friends more exercised over the spread of a virus and its consequences. They are taking it all very seriously and I'm glad they are. On the other hand, whilst even one death from Corona/ Covid-19 is a tragedy, it remains the fact that the world suffers around half a million deaths each year from seasonal 'flu.

Untimely deaths apart, my biggest concern is that if an outbreak occurs Corona will strike at the fabric of community life. Of course it is common sense that if we succumb to it (and the vast majority of those who do catch the virus recover fully and quickly) we shouldn't wish to put others, especially the more vulnerable, at risk; but I really don't look forward to the prospect of the likely cancellation of public events, in the way that is now becoming a global response to the virus. I simply hope and pray that whatever happens here will be short-lived and with minimal impact on community life.

We could try online church services, though I don't suppose a digital country show would be much fun. Much more importantly, we mustn't underestimate the importance of touch. We humans need physical contact for our emotional and physical well-being. Appropriate touch is a vital reaching out to one another – and very different from the abusive touch that seeks to grasp and control. Touching with respect and warmth can reduce stress and serves to diminish a sense of social isolation. We probably don't do it enough at the best of times, even though as Brits we wouldn't want to go over the top like the French sometimes seem to do (but as you know I'm rather a Francophile ...).

I think it highly significant that at key moments in the Gospel story Jesus was both acutely aware of touch and is recorded as reaching out to touch and reassure those who were scared or ill. I also believe that perhaps Princess Diana's most powerful gesture was her willingness to reach out and touch those affected by HIV/AIDS when others would not do so.

Whatever happens over the coming months and whatever measures we have to take to control the spread of the Corona Virus let's make sure we don't lose touch with one another.
