Gardening column- Karen Melvin





We've had a truly beautiful snowy winter with many days of snow balancing on every little twig and needle in the sun. I've been enjoying the obliteration of all greenery and the subsequent sculptural forms of trees and the landscape; I don't want to think about gardening. And it is so hard to believe what is to come. Sometimes in February there is a rise in temperature and you can notice the scent of early flowering plants. It is so welcoming to stand transfixed on a still day by scent in the air. We have a winter box, Sarcococca hookeriana, by the kitchen door and the scent can be strong for meters around. With our strange climate change we had spring flowers at Christmas including the winter flowering cherry, but the snow put a stop to it and we wait for it to re-emerge.

In years past I would visit my sister in Florida in the winter and enjoy her sub-tropical garden and the wonderful botanic gardens. Here in the UK at East Rushton, one of the grand theatrical gardens in Suffolk, there is a lush tropical feel in some of the garden rooms they have created. This planting is in a sheltered walled garden so I was surprised the see some echium pininana, giant viper's bugloss, growing up here in Northumberland at Capheaton Hall - and in the ground, not a pot. This very interesting garden was open with masks, distancing and pre-booked tickets last summer. Giant echium are native to the Canary Islands and Madeira and take at least two



years to flower, are tender and need well drained soil. So the strategy might be to grow them in a pot until they look large enough to flower and then plant out. The crown should be about a meter across when they flower. Two huge flowering stems at Capheaton stood up tall and another one equally dramatically landed its tip on the ground a few meters away. They scatter seed, then die. Well, I have just joined the Hardy Plants Society and find they have a seed exchange included so I am trying some echium as well as some other things I have never heard of. Watch this space.

On another more mundane note, March is the time to dig out Spanish bluebells from flowerbeds, just as they start to appear before they have put out roots. They are vigorous and will choke more choice plants. This is also the time to prune old coloured stems of Cornus to encourage the young coloured growth rather than the duller mature woody stems, also last year's flowering stems of buddleia.

A View from the Vicarage

As the editors have called for more joyful and uplifting stories, I thought I tell you a bit about the first church holiday I tried to organise. I'd been well used to taking wine and archaeology tours to France by coach, so worked out that we could offer a bargain holiday for 36 parishioners on the same basis. We soon had a waiting list. And it all went terribly well. Even the onboard communion service as we whizzed through the channel tunnel was a success. The week shot by with visits, lots of laughter, time to relax together and eat great French food. We even entertained the group for tea at our tiny cottage, though forced by a sudden downpour to huddle in the barn for shelter.

On the way back north, I'd arranged an overnight stop in Auxerre with a wine-tasting supper in the cellars of friends who make delicious Chablis and other local delights. All felt well with the world, although we were running a wee bit late. I thought I'd better phone the hotel to check that all was OK, only to receive the heart-stopping news that they had no record of our booking. The bus company had forgotten to do it. And there was no room. Fortunately, I knew the hotel well and they helped me out (by now I was in tears) by phoning round friends in the business, and by the time we reached Auxerre with the group little the wiser, we'd been accommodated in two other hotels not too far away.

All was well and the party in the wine cellars went with a swing. We thought we'd taken a bit of risk, but the elderly members of the group, some of whom were tasting fine Chablis for the very first time, took to it like lemonade. They also bought quite a lot. So much so that our friends had to deliver it the next morning in a white van. I don't quite know how we crammed it all into the boot.

But I'm getting ahead of myself. The party broke up around midnight with the group singing their hearts out all the way back to our hotels about 10 miles away.

Somehow, they all got off the bus. Some fell, some floated. Olwen and I didn't sleep a wink: we were petrified that some of the oldies were so well oiled that they'd die in the night. I could just imagine the headlines. Not a bit of it, of course. One old soul, almost ninety, and one of the lustiest singers for whom we'd feared most, claimed she'd had the best sleep of her life. The breakfast bars were devoured with relish. And we had to organise another holiday the following year. This time I booked the hotels myself and ensured that any wine tastings were far more carefully monitored – a quick hour before lunch.

And the point of all this? Well there isn't one, beyond, of course, the obvious one that you shouldn't ever judge folk by their appearance – as our wine making friends were the first to say the morning after the party. And if you ever thought that the church is a place of dreary singing and not much fun, think again.

The Slaley Vicarage weather station has continued to fascinate us through February so far.

Total precipitation for the last 23 days is 80.3mm. However, 37.85mm fell on just 2 days, February 3rd and 5th. On the weekend of the 12-14th February we were cut off. After all, Smith's News failed to deliver the newspapers! Owing to the dry, granular nature of the snow and the strong, gusting winds on the Friday night, the snow was blown off the fields and into deep drifts on the roads and in our gardens. By the morning, the wind was still gusting more than 35 mph, force 7, on the Beaufort Scale (force 8 is gale force). We have all benefitted from the considerably higher temperatures of recent days. The maximum temperature, so far, has been 12.3°C and the minimum -7.9°C.

FOCACCIA

Well worth the time and effort - Good Luck!

strong plain white bread flour, 7g sachet fast action yeast salt, 40g olive oil + extra for drizzling

400 ml tepid water Rosemary and sea salt

- 1. Place all ingredients in a large mixing bowl and mix well to a wet dough
- 2. Cover the bowl with a damp tea towel and prove in a warm place for 40 mins
- 3. With an oiled hand and keeping the dough in the bowl fold over a few times
- 4. Cover again and leave for 50 mins or until doubled in size
- 5. Liberally oil a baking tin (I use 32 x 26 cm) and tip the dough into it

- 6. With an oiled hand fold in half and half again and press the dough well into the edges of the tin
- 7. Cover and leave to prove for 50 mins
- 8. Preheat the oven to 220 °C
- 9. Drizzle the dough with olive oil, stud with rosemary and sprinkle with sea salt
- 10. Cook for 20 mins or until risen and golden
