SLALEY NEWS SEPTEMBER 2018



Another summer break has ended, during which we have enjoyed a tropical Summer and the welcome absence of the noise of grass cutters. This came to an abrupt stop the day after the show and the variable weather has persisted putting a stop to harvesting but allowing the grass to resume its relentless regrowth. That's country life for you!

However if you are aware of the birds around us you may have observed a barn owl on its evening hunting mission over the fields either side of the main street. Our local expert has provided the following information.

Barn Owls in Slaley

If you live in the village you may have been lucky enough to see one or more Barn Owls hunting over the fields at dawn or dusk this summer. This pair of Barn Owls nested in a hole in a tree below the Rose & Crown and successfully raised 17 young owls between 2013 & 2017. All of these young owls were ringed in the nest. Two of them have subsequently been found – one was found with a broken wing at Chester-le-Street and was taken into care in October 2016 and another was found dead on Hexham Golf Course in November 2016.

In 2018 the owls moved and took up residence in a purpose built swish new box made by Kevin Doonan on the other side of the village. This box has been up for a few years but was only used by Jackdaws until now.

Five eggs were laid and the first young owl hatched round about the 28th May. On 2nd July the nest was visited again and there were four young surviving, all of which were ringed with British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) rings. At least one of the young owls has been seen recently exercising its wings outside the box so the young should be fledging soon.

Helen's Ponderings

Stories make a place. I've become more vividly aware of this recently. A book I read on holiday by Andrew Rumsey made me think a bit, but it was the people of Fonsoumagne who drove the point home. Our little cottage in the hamlet of Fonsoumagne is in the middle of nowhere, in the middle of France. It has been our retreat since 1991. We love it dearly, but realise that we could never be truly settled there if it were our permanent home. At times, especially in winter, it's too quiet, there's no-one around, no-one to tell its stories.

This summer we decided to have a village meal together. About fifty of us gathered for a bbq in a green space between the houses and nattered long into the night and then sang a bit too. The following day some of us got together again. Marie-Paule reminded us of the time, thirty years ago, when she and her husband to be, Gabi, turned their car over on one of the local roads. She was fine, but was taken off in an ambulance to hospital for a check. In the meantime, word got round, helped by a large country gathering at a funeral in another village, that there'd been a terrible accident involving Paul Lagarde's daughter, complete with lots of flashing lights and an ambulance. Anxious to know the story, the priest and funeral director, shot straight round after the service to see Marie-Paule's parents, Paul and Marie-Louise – our close neighbours. Marie-Louise, of course, got a horrible shock, not even knowing that her daughter had had an accident, and immediately, feared the worst.

As the wine was shared, more stories flowed and we felt a deeper connection with the place. It may never be our place fully, but we realised that part of us belongs there and always will, and we looked at its familiar contours in a new way; and we felt profoundly happy.

It's the people who make our villages, woods and fells here what they are too, not just because the hand of human activity is everywhere to be seen, but by the stories we tell about this place.

It's in the middle of these stories that you'll find God too, if you are so minded, as surely as in the stories we tell about God's encounter with people in the past. God is found in space and time, in our place, in our traditions and in our lives. There's no need to look anywhere else.

Apparently, the co-operative movement in Britain began in the north of England in the mid- 19^{th} Century. The Co-operative Wholesale Society was formed in 1863 and began by selling wholesale foods and other goods to its members. There were as many as 1,000 co-operative societies in Britain in the 19^{th} century all owned by their members.

A division for loans and deposits was founded in 1872

Today the Co-operative group is the largest "mutual" business in the UK serving its seven million customers and members, it is also the biggest funeral provider and the third largest pharmacy chain, employs more than 100,000 people and according to its website has a turnover in excess of £13bn.
