I have been asked by several people if there would be any reference to Brian in this edition of the News. A difficult task for someone who has only lived in the village for twenty years to speak about another who was born at Town Foot Farm 76 years ago and spent the rest of his life in Slaley.

I have therefore borrowed some thoughts from Bryony Gibson and hope they will stir memories in the minds of all who knew Brian. Bryony writes

"Thank you for asking us to provide a memory or two of our association with Brian, when we lived at High Clear.

Brian was a stalwart.

He had been gardener there for several years before our arrival. He preferred to work in the vegetable garden, and he knew what would grow and what would grow where. So, when I tactfully suggested other varieties, or indeed other vegetables all together he was polite enough to consider, but preferred to stick with the tried and tested - with good results, as he regularly carried off prizes at the Slaley Show.

When we got together to buy seeds from the seed catalogue, I was always tremendously impressed with his mental arithmetic skills, he could add up in a flash.

Brian loved racing, and was most adept and successful when it came to backing horses - complicated accumulating! Again his mental arithmetic skills came usefully into play!

He was reliable, he either biked up the village, or in bad weather walked. He was fond of High Clear and the garden. For many years he kept the churchyard neat and tidy as well.

Brian was quiet and kept his own counsel, but with gentle encouragement, would tell me about the village and the history of the farming families.

He was a countryman.

September 2021 gardening column- Karen Melvin

This is the season of cutting back. We opened the garden twice in late summer and in the intervening ten days I had to take out barrow loads of trimmings so the garden could still show off its state of floweriness rather than seediness.



Hardy Geraniums, Galegas, Campanulas, and grannys bonnets were cut half way or right back to encourage more flowering. With all this keeping tidy, I am very surprised at how good the garden looks in late summer early autumn, so full of hot colour. We visited Middle Grange, Paula Darrington's Slaley garden, which was full of contrasting plants of stately form and colour. Heleniums contrast with bright red Crocosmia Lucifer in the background; Echinops Veitchs blue glowed in its steely blue colour contrasting with red hot dahlias.

In our garden a single Red Mohican Allium popped up, purchased from a plant fair two years ago. At Bradley Gardens I saw a huge clump of them dramatically flopping over a wall. I sowed many annuals this year, Larkspur, Nicotiana, Cosmos, both red and white, and the beautiful delicate rhoeas poppies. A lot of wild red ones appeared, but also the hazy grey purple ones dotted around; these I find difficult as they rarely Pop establish themselves by self seeding.

It was glorious to have people sitting in the garden again, eating cake, listening to live music, and looking at flowers; it doesn't get better than this. We raised money for the new Slaley, Healey and Hexhamshire Community Environmental Group, who aim to plant more trees and raise awareness of environmental issues. There was also a stall at the new Slaley Artisan Market selling plants, baked goods, jams, crafts and second hand items. There is so much stress on the environment, with the ash trees slowly succumbing - and worse news from around the world - that coming together to make an effort feels positive.

Walking in Letah Wood, I came upon a large patch of plants I hadn't noticed here before. They stood up on stems about a foot high with white dots of flowers all along the stems. The flowers were so tiny, like a grain of sea salt, I put

them on the scanner to magnify and allow identification. The plant is Enchanter's Nightshade, Circaea lutetiana, magically named after Circe who enchanted Ulysses' crew in Homer's Odyssey. It is not poisonous but in centuries past was used for transformations and shape-shifting. All to see in Letah Wood.

A View from the Vicarage

I'm proud to be English, but truth be told, I more often than not prefer to describe myself as British. After all, I tell myself, some of my roots, way back when, are Welsh. But why am I hesitant about by my overwhelming Englishness?

But it seems that I'm not alone in being a bit too shy of my Englishness. John Denham, a former Labour cabinet minister and now Director, Centre for English Identity and Politics at Southampton University points out that if UK politicians aren't from Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland, they tend to talk about 'the country', but not about England or Englishness'.

Other commentators have pointed out that people from what might be described as working-class communities in declining industrial cities, or nolonger prosperous sea-side towns, feel that their concerns aren't understood by London-based politicians, who seem to assume that the Union provides for English interests perfectly well. The same politicians then concentrate power even more in the capital and the South-East.

But we also need have to address why so few BAME Britons say they're proud to be English. A 2018 BBC survey showed that only 32% of BAME Britons say they're proud to be English, compared with 61% of white Britons. The same survey revealed that to be English was seen as conservative (with a small 'c') and traditional, rather than liberal and out-ward looking.

Perhaps even more worrying is the finding that three-quarters of all people surveyed felt that England was 'better in the past' than believe that 'its best years lie in the future.' How do we live with such an overwhelming burden of nostalgia?

Last month, Stephen Cottrell the Archbishop of York wrote a widely-reported newspaper article in which he asked what it means to be English. He claimed that national unity is more fractured than he has ever known in his lifetime and called for a new and expansive vision of what it means to be English.

But if a new and more expansive, widely-shared love for our English nation is to be based on its stories and values as well as its amazing landscapes and quirky weather, I can't help thinking that we must dig deeper than the Archbishop does in believing that Englishness is defined by courage,

compassion and enterprise – though none of those things is anything but admirable.

That apart, he is surely right to call on all those who work in the voluntary sector, culture, academia, the arts and faith organisations to explore or reflect the range of views amongst the people who live in England. And we in the Church of England really must hold up our hands and admit our failure to do this as well as we ought.

We have, I believe, to be honest about ourselves, our history, our real values and the needs of everyone in our society – and ensure that everyone has a voice and everyone is properly listened to. And if we do that, I for one, will be even more proud to be identified as English.

Slaley Weather Report for the Summer

Rain, or lack of it has been the theme of our weather over the summer period. I'm quoting Tomasz Schafernaker (the BBC weather-man) who said today (23rd August) that we'd probably have dry conditions until after the Bank Holiday.

In June, we had 24 days without rain. In July, there was more of the wet stuff, with 16 days without rain. As we all know, August has lived up to its reputation as being a pretty poor month for holidays as far as weather is concerned. We've only had 8 dry days. However, we've also had days of minimal rainfall but cool temperatures.

The reason why our weather gets stuck in particular patterns is the position of the jet stream. When it swings to the north of us, we may have high pressure, and little rainfall, but cloud can be blown in from the North Sea, winds from the north-east and lower temperatures. This seems to be how August might end.

June and July were our warmest months with 28°C on June 16th, 27°C on July 20th and our summer maximum, 28.6°C on July 21st.

On July 22nd we had 87% relative humidity – a measure of how much moisture the air can hold. All that changed on August 1st with a maximum temperature of 14.9°C.

August has continued to be very changeable, with the jet stream funnelling Atlantic depressions our way with monotonous regularity. Maybe Mr Schafernaker will be right, and we'll have a quiet, if coolish end to the month.
