Iris Silicon
Prairie
Some irises that I planted two years ago failed to bloom and, having totally forgotten what I ordered, I am waiting expectantly to see what they look like. I was mainly after something pinkish with fancy curls, but during lockdown there was a run on plants, so not too many colours were left to choose. Two of the irises had buds that appeared to be waiting for some warmth - like the rest of us in early June - but these buds rotted even though it hasn't been particularly wet. They were in a prime position in front of the border; I guess the climate up north is too much for them. Our survivor, lovely short *Iris Langport Storm*, is clustered with blooms that you look down on, mauves and violets coming together with textured tufty beards. My favourite, called *Silicon Prairie*, is strong, tall, and blousy, a bloom of delicate pale yellow and pale mauve. It is happily positioned in front of creeping yellow leaved, blue flowering *Viola cornuta* and the simple yellow day lily trumpets of *Hemerocallis flava*.

Carolside House, up in the Scottish Borders, has a magnificent collection of irises some of which came from France, tall blooms with petals that ripple in the breeze, some pale soft romantic colours, others dark and velvety. They make mounds of colour one flowing into the other, creating a feeling of lush floweriness. In early June the classic rose collection should have been out in the grand oval walled garden, but the cold spring delay meant we got to see the irises instead. Carolside is a romantic place; every view through the garden is considered, all relate to the landscape around and to the spaces within the enclosures. Passing through each gate or doorway presents new drama and contrast, with different textures of planting and combinations of colour and form. There are seats that welcome a pause to contemplate the immediate surroundings. Then, right at the garden's edge, there is a long walk between tall hornbeam hedging, a peaceful walk, stroked by green, the stuff of life. At the end of the green walk an oval window pierces the hedge to frame a wider landscape of hills, ancient trees, and grazing sheep.

Elsewhere, Newby Hall gardens house the national collection of Cornus. I love these trees where the flowering bracts sit like butterflies along the branches and catch the light in large flat blooms. My two Cornus trees are developing their bracts right now but were not quite fully open for our open garden Wander.



In June we had a very enjoyable evening at Helens with a tour of her amazing garden followed by supper and a glass of fizz. We discovered we were not very good at quits! Thank you Helen.

At the suggestion of a few new members some of us went to the Forum to see Top Gun with a drink afterwards. Great film, good company and an enjoyable night had by all.

Slaley Leek Club

Our annual show will take place on Saturday 10th September in the Commemoration Hall. Due to Coronavirus we have only been able to have a very much reduced show over the past two years for members' leeks and junior leeks only. This year we intend to introduce about twenty simple flower, fruit and vegetable classes open to everyone in the village. So please support our local show which has been a feature of our village life for over sixty years. We have kept the classes simple so that anyone who has a garden can enter. Schedules will be available on line at slaley.org and in the village shop from the end of July.

News from your Community Environmental Group (CEG)

Who isn't concerned at the impact that we have on our environment – just by living – and then we feel powerless to do anything about it? The words springing to mind are "climate change" and "waste plastic". With the latter we have a chance to join a concerted effort to make a difference.

Plastic Free July is with us - you are invited to think about how much single use plastic passes through your hands and to commit to reducing or eliminating at least one part of it for the month and maybe permanently. That could be through not buying plastic bottles of pop or water, choosing loose veg at the supermarket rather than pre-wrapped bags (and reduce food waste at the same time) or cutting out the use of cling film.

Slaley Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 13 June. For part of that meeting they were joined by councillors from Healey Parish to allow representations to be made to the leader of Northumberland County Council, Councillor Glen Sanderson, about matters of concern within their respective parishes. Healey councillors spoke of issues around activities at School House Farm, whilst Slaley councillors expressed their concerns around traffic safety at Glen Crossroads. Councillor Sanderson acted positively after the meeting, giving some hope that additional weight might be added to resolving these long running issues.

Rural Crime

Sadly, crime seems to be on the increase in our community. Several vehicles have been stolen in recent weeks and there are instances of theft in relation to personal possessions too. Remaining vigilant and reporting persons or things of suspicion to the police on 999 (in an emergency) or 101 (non-emergency) can help keep us all safer and thieves at bay.

Owners of 4X4s and those who store diesel on their premises are encouraged to ensure they are secured at all times, especially overnight.

Dog poo

A number of parishioners have recently raised concerns about the apparent increase in dog faeces not picked up by owners in and around the village. As we all know, dog poo can be unsightly and cause a health risk not only to humans but livestock too. Those with dogs are encouraged to clean up after them, not only in the village but in the surrounding fields and woodlands. The parish council are also looking to do their bit by installing two new dog waste bins to make the disposal of collected poo that bit easier.



Become a Councillor There are two vacancies on Slaley Parish Council at the moment and for the sake of democracy we would love them to be filled. Tempted, the following may give you a little insight into the role of parish councils and the part you could play. A parish council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people in the parish. It is the level of government closest to the community, with the county authority above it in the hierarchy. As the authority closest to the people, parish councils are invariably the first port of call people go to with their concerns or ideas. For this reason, they are a vital part of any community.

Why become a Parish Councillor?

As a parish councillor, you become someone your community will look to for help, guidance and support, a community leader who can influence decisions for the benefit of others within your community. Seeing your community change for the better as a result of decisions you have helped make, is something that is likely to give you a sense of achievement and pride.

Every summer, my father, a Baptist minister, chose a hymn that begins (to a vaguely jaunty tune): *Summer suns are glowing over land and sea; happy light is flowing bountiful and free. I should know; I was working outdoors on an archaeological site, my first job after graduation. Mr Howell was re-purposed Minister for Floods and later, and I'm not making this up, Minister for Snow. He had a gift.

This year, the weather has already proved extreme. In the part of France where we're buying a house, June saw all-time record temperatures, then destructive hail. Farmers there had already begun to count the cost of late Spring frosts and yet more violent hailstorms.

So what's my point? You might say, it's 'be careful what you pray for.' I wouldn't argue, but also despite all our other worries this summer – war, inflation, strikes and travel chaos we really must remember how fragile our planet is and do all we can, each and every one of us, to address the problem of climate change. It won't go away – whatever hymns we sing.

Slaley weather report

I'm writing this on June 23rd, and it really feels like summer. However, with depressions moving in from the Atlantic we're set for more changeable conditions again for a few days. We really need the rain.

The total rainfall for May was only 45.3mm and so far, this month we've only had 20.5mm, 16.1mm of those fell on only 2 days. We have had unusually dry conditions all year. June was dry last year (35mm) but we had a wetter spring. You just have to look at the Derwent Reservoir to see how much we need rain.

The warmest day of the year so far is today. As I write the temperature is 25.9°. I hope we will have more chances to enjoy al fresco dining this summer.
