June 2021 gardening column- Karen Melvin

When I first started collecting plants for the garden, I went for large dramatic plants like *Crambe cordifolia*, a good 6'x6' spread, cardoon thistles, lovely *Campanula lactiflora Lodden Anna*, and the weird *Phytoacea*, American pokeweed. I came across a root the size of an arm some meters away from Loddon Anna, but connected to it never the less, and quite hard to wrench out. Now that the garden is full, packed to the brim, I look for smaller less thuggish things that can hold their own amongst the sturdy growth of mature plants. Herbaceous geraniums are great for flowering all summer and the granny's bonnets, aquilegias, and bell shaped campanulas are all charming. They suggest a dappled sunny woodland glade and can be tucked into corners leaving no dead areas in the garden. Poppies, peonies and irises carry the show with bright summer colour. After 50 years, I have unaccountably lost the giant red early poppy from the Lawleys at Herterton, Wallington, even though I had them in two locations- sadly missed.

In this cold late spring, the early plants in the rockery held on to their flowers for ages. Our "rockery" started out as a dumping ground for unwanted stones put around an old ash tree. Then when the tree came down and the stump rotted, we planted a mallow, which took up the whole space of about 3 meters square. By the time that died, I was into gardening in a more intricate way, and now have about 60 different plants in the same area. Every now and again I dig out some of those old stones when planting something new. I planned it like a miniature landscape with 3 dwarf trees, that I keep heavily pruned to look like old trees, which they are now, and a 'mountain' mound of *Clematis alpina Willy*.



Mossy saxifrage and silver sedum are coloured, textured, rounded ground cover that set off the miniature *Tulipa batalini Bronze Charm.* The intense blue *Gentiana acaulis*, and yellow auriculas form backdrops. Under the dwarf trees and alpine clematis lurk etherial blue *Anemone blanda* and *Corydalis Blue Heron*.

Leucojum vernum is like a little petticoat with dots around the fringe. *Tulip saxatilis* is a new glowing beauty of a species tulip that survived the winter and spring hail. I have some new veronicas, *Mountain Breeze* and another one that contrasts with a slightly scary red oxalis, very pretty, but inclined to run; it might have to move to the wild garden. It came from Harperley Hall nurseries along with a selection of gorgeous dwarf *Anemone obtusiloba*, that look so delicate, like a hepatica with a flat face surrounded by a daisy crown, but they have already survived a winter and the terrible spring hail storms and late snow.



A View from the Vicarage

Last month I looked forward hugely to the first big step in the lifting of lockdown on 17 May. We were able to see our grandchildren for the first time since last summer – and meet our younger grandson for the first time ever. There were lots of hugs and it was wonderful. But with the hugs came bugs. Back we came speechless, not out of excitement, but with the worst bout of laryngitis we can remember. I have already discovered other grandparents who've met a similar fate. Isolated from one another, we've been healthier than most of us can remember, but now we're like five-year-olds in their first term at school, open to catching every sniffle and virus going the rounds, with precious little resistance.

Being free, as we may well be on 21 June, does not mean we'll be free from one another's problems and ailments – in fact quite the opposite. In some senses, this last, appalling 15 months has brought the risk of making us more self-centred, as much as we may have missed the touch of others. This is

because we've been in control of our movements and contacts in a way none of us have ever before encountered. We've been able to lock our front doors and feel safe. We may not have been able to do or go where we want, but we've been able to suit ourselves to an unprecedented degree.

After four days of full-on grandparenthood, with not a spare moment to myself, I began to see just how disorientingly odd my existence has been during the Covid isolation. Being free, I realised again, means being free to be with others and share their lives in ways I'd almost forgotten – to make little allowance and accommodations, to put their needs before my own, even when I rather be watching Netflix.

The Biblical notion of freedom takes this for granted. It isn't about being free to do anything we want, or about, as Rowan Williams put it rather splendidly, 'to allow our own wonderful, unique, luxuriant personalities to blossom in every possible direction and tread on everyone's toes,' but about realising that not only are you are loved, valued and accepted by God, but that everyone else is too. We're therefore free to contribute to each other's lives and well-being instead, as Williams says, of threatening and feeling threatened by each other. And (and this is me speaking) if we share a few bugs on the way it's all worth it – just to be together and to enjoy the privilege of enjoying one another.

I do so hope that 21st June will be another big step towards enabling us to enjoy community, family and friends as we all so dearly want, but that when the opportunity comes, we'll use it to build one another up, delight in one another and rediscover something of what we've most truly missed.

Slaley Weather Report for May

April was the driest since records began – twenty-one out of thirty-one days had no rain at all, and we had fifteen consecutive days of drought. The total for the month was a meagre 26mm. The frosty nights were a problem for gardeners.

As I write this on May 25th, the month has been more reminiscent of April. Unsettled conditions, showers, many wintery, and of course a considerable snowfall on the 5th/6th of May. The snowmelt amounted to 5.6mm of precipitation. Currently, the total for the month is already 56.8mm, though 8.5mm of rain fell in a single event in the early hours of May 12th.

Temperatures over recent days have reached the mid-teens, but it's felt several degrees cooler in the squally showers. Winds too have been variable and often chilly, coming from the North Sea at the start of the month and have gusted up to 7 and 8 metres per second (18 mph).

As many of you know, we went to Kent as soon as the rules allowed. I can report that the weather was no better in the south. In fact, the downpours were so intense they curtailed some of our plans. As you can imagine, the southerners are not happy with the weather, but then, neither are we.
